The Merchants were this day sent for and discoursed about the increaseing of the severall quantities of cloth allready contracted for and an additionall provision of 2000: ꝑs of Dymithies and 2000: ꝑs of Dyapers [. . .] all which they resolved that for the quantity [. . .] they will use their endeavours but not oblidge themselves noe otherwise then by promise and for the Dymithies and Diapers they will bring Musters to bee veived by the Councell.

M^r: John Field did this day diliver up [the ballance] of the Hono^{ble}: Companys Cash being pago^{da}: 12592: 31: 0: to [M^r:] Vincent Sayon with the other Bookes and papers belonging to this ffactory. The Agent and Councell have enordered that wee increase the Investment this yeare to as much as wee could possible after some discou[rse] the Merchants agreed this day for the provision for [the] following goods more then allready Cont[racted] for Viz^t:

The Governour of this place Mamud Alley Beeg sent his Maldar to the Cheif o congratulate his arrivall here with great promises of ffriendship in the Hono^{ble}: [Comp^{as}:] affaires and further desireing to provide him some Cheeses and strong waters which hee profferd to pay for, but considering his expectations may bee much larger of a piscash It was therefore resolved That 6: Cheeses 2: Cases strong waters 2: 6: Gallon Cases of Brandy and a Chest of rosewater bee sent him as a

[14TH.] present it Costomary on a new Cheifs coming to place to present him with something most agreeable to his humour. There being a great want of Houseold stuff for this ffactory especially of Chaires Tables and one or two Coutches and M^r: ffield haveing belonging to him one dozen of Chaires and a Coutch made of teake wood it is ordered they bee bought for the Companys Acco^t: the Chaires at 2½ rupees each & the Coutch 2½: pago^{ds}: which hee affirms to bee the true cost of them and that M^r: ffield is desired to furnish us from Madapo^{ll}: with as many more of the same sort the house being now soe bare since the removeall of the late Cheif that some of the roomes therein have not above 4: old Chaires in it much to the discredit of our hono^{ble}: Masters.

The Hono^{ble}: Company haveing ordered a settlement this yeare at Pettipollee and there being [some] Merchants of that place concerned with ours in the first Contract made by M^r: ffield &c^a: the Councell which they tooke into Consideration and finding it would bee prejudiciall to the affaires in that place in this present Juncture of time to Continue them did resolve that they bee dismissed from their provision of goods att this place and ordered to applye themselves to the business at Pettepollee and in testimony of respect to them they were Piscasht wth: 3: yards of Scarlett each when they departed very Contentedly

The Musters of Chints of severall grounds were this day veived in Councell and found to bee very deare and not with that Curiosity and Workemanship as desired it was therefore resolved that the Merchants provide a Corge of each ground to bee painted with as much Curiosity and variety as possible to bee sent home to the Hono^{ble}: Company as Musters and y^e: other quantity required to bee Commended to our friends at Pettipollce. The Musters of dimithyes and Dyapers were allsoe veived by the Councell but the Merchants requireing too great a rate for them they departed without makeing any Contract and it is referred to further Consideration.

[11TH] it their duty to procure their Hono^{ble}: Masters goods as cheap as possible, demanded an abatement of 4: ꝯ Cent to bee made thereon, the Merchants Replied that on the 31st: last Month, M^r: Sayon and the Councill had brought them as lowe as possible they could make them for, viz^t: at pago^{ds}: 30: & 28½: ꝯ Corge ready whited and cured without any abatement, and that under that they could nor would not Contract, whereon the Councill using Severall perswasive Arguments with them at last gott them to withdrawe, to cast up the Cost and Charges, thereon and to see if possible they could somewhat complye: after a long debate amongst them they returned that they would abate 1: ꝯ Cent and noe more could they possibly bee bro^t: to whereon the Councill Contracted then with them for 3000 ꝯs viz^t: N^o: 1: at 30: pago^{ds}: ꝯ Corge and N^o: 2: at 28½: to bee bro^t: in ready white and cured at 1: ꝯ Cent abatement which with much difficulty in many houres was obtayned, the Merch^{ts}: alleidgeing that 1: ꝯ Cent would bee a constant abatement for severall yeares, in some of which the Hono^{ble}: Comp^a: might require treble the quantity which in the end would bee considerable.

The Merchants then demanded the payment of their ⅔ according to Contract, at which the Councill replied they should soe soone as wee had Contracted for the dyapers required by the Hono^{ble}: Company; to which they answered they could not possibly provide them haveing undertaken this yeare so large an Investment as the like was never knowne before in this place, and that they must Severally bestir themselves to bring in what they had Contracted for which they promised to doe and y^t: [y^o:] they should give a promise of those dyapers, they were certayne could not complye therewith the time being farr spent and the mony not given them in time for provideing soe Considerable an Investment which amounts unto pago^{ds}: 129015: Contracted for on the 1st: Muster of each sort as ꝯ agreement made with the Merchants the 2^d: of Aprill 1679: all abatements being de[ducte]d besides the Carpetts for which 700: pago^{ds}: is givin out whereon the Councill ordered them the paym^{ts} of pago^{ds}: 5010 which fully Compleats the payment of their ⅔:

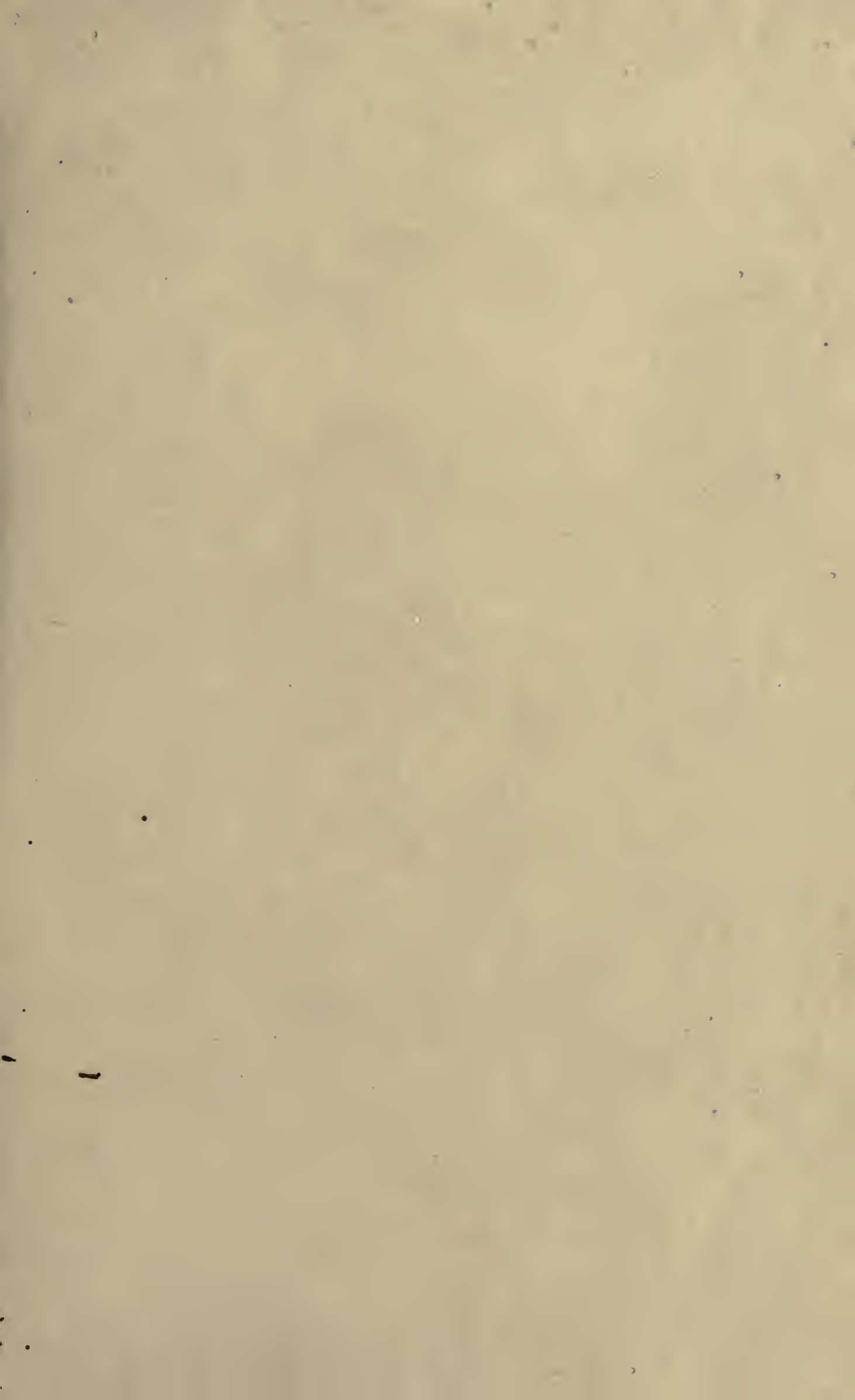
